# Copperhaven School: Development Plan Results Report November, 2024



At Copperhaven School, we have created a literacy and numeracy-rich environment filled with authentic opportunities for all learners. Our students develop and apply knowledge, skills and attitudes for successful learning, living and working. As a K-9 School in Spruce Grove, Copperhaven School has unique opportunities to celebrate a diverse group of learners, including many who are English Language Learners. In September of 2023, the population of Copperhaven School was 710 students with 32 teaching staff and 17 support staff.

In alignment with the <u>Government of Alberta's Curriculum Implementation guide</u>, new curriculum in the following areas was implemented during the 2023-24 school year.

- English Language Arts and Mathematics Grades 4-6
- Science Grades K-3

These changes required a focus on building teacher capacity through professional development, along with resource development at both a school and divisional level.

Copperhaven's primary areas of focus for the 2023-24 school year were:

- Effective teaching practices in literacy, numeracy and Indigenous Ways of Knowing
- Supporting student wellness and community
- Supporting workplace wellness

This report will reflect on successes and areas of growth specific to literacy and numeracy, including Provincial Achievement Test results, while also addressing contextual factors. Additionally, Alberta Education Assurance




Measures Report (AMR) data will be provided to examine growth and areas of concern regarding student well-being and community involvement. These results are reviewed annually with the Copperhaven School Council including seeking input on priority areas.

Using student and community data to reflect on the successes and challenges of the 2023-24 school year, will allow our staff to refine skills and strategies to support student learning. With new assessments put forward by Alberta Education beginning in 2022, increased data points in literacy and numeracy are available in grades 1-4. Baseline screeners in literacy and numeracy at all grade levels continue to inform classroom teaching and intervention approaches.

## Literacy (Reading) Grades 1-6

Copperhaven school utilises several measures in regards to student achievement in reading. One formalised tool is the Fountas and Pinnell reading assessment, which captures student reading fluency and comprehension skills. The graphics below communicate school results from grades 1-6 followed by reflection statements.



#### Reflections

Students in grades 1-6 achieving at and above grade level increased by 7% over the 2023-24 school year. Strategies in place such as in-class and external interventions, literacy lead teacher, small group instruction and comprehensive literacy plans attributed to this success. There is a continued need for small group interventions focused on reading comprehension, fluency and phonological awareness. Key resources included Heggerty, decodable texts, comprehension based texts, and phonological awareness games and activities. The frequency of targeted groups must also be examined to ensure effective support for students.

In relation to Parkland School Division (PSD) data, more Copperhaven students achieved at or above grade level in September 2023 (1.4%), however Copperhaven was lagging Divisional achievement in June 2024 by 2.3%. In response, for the 2024-25 school year several structures will be implemented including phonological awareness instruction, additional resource purchasing of decodable texts, and assessment practices in intervention groups paired with foundational reading skill instruction.


Two additional reading assessment tools utilised were the *Lens* and *CC3*. These literacy assessments identify those students in grades 1-4 who require extra support in areas of letter/sound recognition and sight word recognition. The graph below indicates significant growth in sight word recognition in grades 2-4. The data also reveals a continued need to address these areas from grades 1-4.






## Literacy (Reading) Grades 7-9

At a Junior High level, the Reading Comprehension Assessment Tool (RCAT) is used to evaluate student achievement in five key domains related to reading success. These domains are closely linked to Provincial Achievement Test areas and indicate to teaching professionals areas of need for individual students and class wide areas of focus. Results of the RCAT are illustrated in the following graphs/tables, along with reflection statements to follow.

#### Reflections


Overall, students in Grade 7-9 showed a decrease in skills of comprehension strategies according to the RCAT measure. For the 2024-25 school year, a continued focus on small group reading comprehension instruction at the Jr High level will be prioritised. This includes frequency and structure of targeted reading groups. Key areas on the initial RCAT screener will be examined with teaching teams in September 2024 to determine steps to support more learners in achieving at the level of competence and excellence.


In relation to Parkland School Division (PSD) data, more Copperhaven students achieved at or above grade level in September 2023 (10.7%), and June 2024 (3.2%).

#### Reflections

School results indicate an increase in writing achievement, however this remains below divisional results. Anecdotally, teaching staff indicate high standards at a school level may impact comparative data. The use of divisional rubrics to facilitate common assessment practices will be a focus for 2024-25. A clear writing scope and sequence along with adequate resources is necessary to ensure writing success. Teachers will identify exemplars of writing samples at every grade level. To increase available data, four formalised school-based writing check points will be put in place for the 2024-25 school year.

## Literacy (Word Study) Grades 4-9

Through daily work and assessments, teaching staff noticed a deficit in student vocabulary skills and in particular an understanding of root/prefix/suffix components of language. The use of the Words Their Way assessment confirms a need to address these gaps.

## School Data Comparison to Parkland School Division

#### Reflections

A decrease of 3.5% was indicated for students achieving at grade level on the Words Their Way Spelling Inventory. This data suggests a continued focus on word work at the younger grades along with vocabulary focused lessons at the Jr High level are necessary. In grades 1-9 word work is embedded in small group and/or whole group instruction.

## Numeracy

During the 2023-24 school year, Parkland School Division students in Grades 1-5 were assessed using the Government of Alberta approved Elk Island Numeracy Screen. Overall, 81% of students in Grades 1-5 were achieving at the expected level according to Alberta Government Norms. These students were identified as "not at risk."

A visual comparison for "at risk" students in September 2023 and May 2024 data follows. Of note, Grade 1 students completed the assessment in January 2024, meaning results are compared January 2024 - May 2024.

## Comparison Chart for "At Risk" Students Grades 1-5


#### Reflections

The Numeracy Screener revealed an area of growth for all students in understanding place value especially in relation to working with number lines.

Small group numeracy instruction will be essential in relation to new curricular expectations. Continued numeracy intervention external to the classroom will be a priority for the 2024-25 school year.

## MIPI Results Grades 5 - 9

During the 2023-24 school year, baseline student achievement in numeracy was measured using the Math Intervention Programming Instrument (MIPI). This assessment tool communicates student achievement on key outcomes for the previous year of learning. For example, students in Grade 5 are assessed based on their competence with Grade 4 outcomes, students in Grade 6 are assessed on Grade 5 outcomes, etc. The graphic below compares the percent of students who required attention in September 2023 and June 2024.



#### Reflections

Across grades 7-9, there was a reduction in the percentage of students requiring attention to previous year curricular outcomes. Grade 7 showed a 20% reduction, Grade 8 - 33% and Grade 9 - 17%. Ongoing strategies such as targeted small group instruction and continued focus on *Building Thinking Classrooms* is necessary for 2024-25 to address conceptual mathematical learning. Additionally, the 2024-25 grade 7 cohort will be the first student group who has been instructed based on new Alberta Government curricular outcomes to advance to Jr High. This will require an adjusted assessment tool to assess new curricular material.

- Explore strategies to support learners who are achieving below the acceptable standard in all domains; and in particular Mathematics 9


## Alberta Education Assurance Measures Report (AMR)

#### Reflections

Students in Grades 4 and 7, along with their parents, reported a decline in the area of active citizenship. The number of respondents for students was 129, and the number of parents was 18. More detailed data is needed to understand the factors impacting these students and the school community as a whole. Examination of data with teaching teams, and reflections of quality of classroom instruction including initiatives to sustain engagement, are necessary.

The data shows that Copperhaven School has consistently reported higher student satisfaction regarding active citizenship compared to the overall Parkland School Division data. Notably, in 2020 and 2021, Copperhaven's satisfaction rates were 6.5 percentage points above the division average. While there has been a slight decline in satisfaction in recent years for both Copperhaven and the division, Copperhaven's rates remain relatively strong. This trend suggests that Copperhaven effectively fosters active citizenship, maintaining a positive impact on student perceptions compared to the broader division.

Active student citizenship and attendance are closely connected. When students feel they are active contributors to their school and community—through responsibilities like participating in school activities, supporting peers, and understanding civic values—they are more likely to attend regularly. This sense of belonging and purpose motivates them to stay involved and present, as they see themselves as integral members of their school community. For this reason, Copperhaven staff focused on increasing awareness of consistent attendance for families and students. The results of this initiative are captured below.
